We are the largest artisan art market in Latin America.

In 2025, Original will celebrate its fifth anniversary by expanding from north to south, embracing Mexico with the beauty and power of artisan art.

This year, the Textile Art Encounter will arrive in Baja California, Yucatán, and Mexico City. This growth responds to President Claudia Sheinbaum's order to bring social justice to indigenous and Afro-Mexican communities, historically forgotten and neglected, which today find a space for recognition and dignity in Original.

In November, Original will visit Baja California, a vibrant state, epicenter of cultures, diversity, and economic development, known as the gateway to Latin America. The Mexican Textile Art Encounter Original Baja California will be held at the Centro Cultural Tijuana, bringing together master artisans from across the country, with a range that include textile art, jewelry, accessories, and decorative and utilitarian art.

The presence of local indigenous communities—Cochimí, Cucapá, Kikapú, Kiliwa, Kumiai, and Paipai—will make this encounter a true mosaic of identity, creativity, and memory. In this way, Original Baja California will not only showcase the talent of artisans, but also highlight the living heritage of a state that reflects Mexico's cultural diversity.



Mexican Textile Art Encounter



A living legacy, a necessary movement

With their hands, artisans tell ancient stories that reveal details of our identity. They inherited a wide range of knowledge and practices that speak of resilience, belonging, and creativity.

For generations, indigenous and Afro-Mexican communities have cared for their art as if protecting a sacred legacy. However, they have suffered plagiarism, dispossession, and misappropriation of their designs, symbols, and techniques.

Original was created to change this. Launched in 2021 by the Ministry of Culture of the Government of Mexico, this movement promotes and protects artisan art as collective heritage and living legacy.

Mexican textile art for the first time at Los Pinos

Original held the first Mexican Textile Art Encounter in December 2021, at the Centro Cultural Los Pinos.

The purpose was to organize a large artisan textile art market that would make a significant difference in the way it is exhibited, sold, and purchased without giving recognition to the creator:

First, the artisans would be at the center of the Encounter, that is, they would be protagonists at all times, from considerations for their transportation, the allocation of sales stands, topics and needs for their training, to the visibility of their names, origins, and languages in promotional materials.

Second, it would facilitate direct contact between the audience and artisans, which means that artisan art for sale would be exhibited by its creators rather than by intermediaries.

Third, the pieces would be labeled indicating the name of the artisan, place of origin, the name of the piece, the technique and materials used, as well as the price.

Fourth, awareness would be raised among the audience to encourage them to make fair purchases, saying "No bargaining!" and valuing the creator.

Fifth, the purchase of certified, original artisan art would be guaranteed for the audience.

Sixth, a runway would be organized where the protagonists would be the artisans themselves, who, in front of the audience, cameras, and spotlights, would show their pieces of textile art.

Seventh, a training program would be offered to artisans based on the topics that interest them the most.

Eighth, a program of activities related to intangible cultural heritage, indigenous traditions, artisanal creation, and food culture would be offered to raise public awareness regarding artisan art.

Therefore, the Mexican Textile Art Encounters have grown and strengthened, reaching a wider audience each year. In these four years:

866,000 people have visited Original in Mexico City.

95% of the artisans who have participated in Original have been able to provide opportunities for their families, such as employment, access to health care, and education.


Exhibition and saleof certified crafts

30 artisans, 27 of whom belong to 5 indigenous communities.


The artisan art of Baja California is vibrant, diverse, and deeply connected to its roots. The artisans who will be at Original Baja California belong to the indigenous groups: Cochimí, Cucapá, Kumiai, Kiliwa, and Paipai. They will share their creativity and ancestral knowledge through handcrafted pieces that tell us about the history of the region. Their presence brings to life a unique cultural mosaic that reaffirms Baja California as a territory in constant change, but also as the guardian of Mexico's rich identity.



Business Room

A space designed to facilitate direct encounters between artisans and individuals interested in establishing collaborations, wholesale purchases, or new joint projects.

A place that promotes dialogue and commercial opportunities, always under the **principles of ethical collaboration** that distinguish Original, guaranteeing fair and respectful relationships with creative communities.



Guidance to fair negotiation with artisans

Are you interested in doing business with artisans? Then you should read this:

Artisan art is the living heritage of indigenous peoples and creative communities with collective copyright.

Therefore, it cannot be copied, reproduced, or used as inspiration and/or tribute without permission from the communities that hold this knowledge.

A) Legal framework

In **2024**, Article 2 of the Constitution was amended, recognizing indigenous and Afro-Mexican peoples and communities as subjects of public law, with legal personality and their own heritage.

In 2022, the Federal Law for the Protection of the Cultural Heritage of Indigenous and Afro-Mexican Peoples and Communities (LFPPCPCIA, Ley Federal de Protección del Patrimonio Cultural de los Pueblos y Comunidades Indígenas y Afromexicanas) was enacted, recognizing cultural heritage and collective intellectual property.

In **2020**, the Federal Copyright Law was amended, removing artisan art and traditional art forms from the public domain and placing them on an equal legal footing with any literary or artistic work: Article 157 recognizes the intellectual property rights of indigenous and Afro-Mexican peoples and communities.

The law reinforces protection against the exploitation of cultural property, reaffirming in Article 158 the obligation to obtain written authorization from the owner people or community.

In **2021,** the **Original Decalogue** was created to guide fair and ethical commercial relations between artisans and purchasers.



C) Principles of ethical collaboration

Every day we weave a stronger network of justice, collectivity, and respect. Our initiative focuses on changing awareness around artisan art, promoting fair trade, sustainability, and ethical exchange.






Runways
